

Temecula Olive Oil Ranch Address: 47680 CA-371, Aguanga, CA 92536

Directions: Take Interstate-15 North from San Diego or Interstate-15 South from Orange County to Temecula Parkway/Highway 79 South. Follow for 18 miles east until you reach a stop with a flashing light at Highway 371. Turn left. The Ranch is immediately on your right. Turn right onto the dirt road just before the Temecula Olive Oil Company sign. Follow the trees to the parking area. The trip takes about 25 minutes from Old Town Temecula and/or Interstate-15.

Reminder: GPS devices are not recommended for finding the ranch by its street address as it will send you about 2 miles too far.

Driving Time Estimate: On GPS app check time from starting location to intersection of I-15 and CA-79. Add 25 minutes driving time to the Ranch.

Backyard Tip: Crushed Eggshells Are for the Birds



Many species, including tree swallows, eat crushed eggshells both for calcium and for use as grit. Share:

When you make your breakfast eggs, save the eggshells! We can hear you asking: "What? Why?" The answer is they are a great addition to your bird-feeding program. Many different species eat crushed eggshells both for the calcium they provide to nesting females and for use as grit in the food-digesting process in the gizzards of seed- and insect-eating birds. Rinse out your eggshells, place them in a metal tray in an oven set at 325 degrees. Bake the shells for 20 to 30 minutes to kill off any bacteria from the domestic chickens that laid them, then crush the shells and spread them on a flat, open surface such as a sidewalk, driveway, deck railing, low roof, or patch of bare soil. Swallows, martins, sparrows, finches, bluebirds, and other backyard birds will visit this new offering.

What Nesting Materials Are Safe for Birds?

Follow these dos and don'ts if you want to help your feathered neighbors build their homes this spring.

To successfully help your birds with their nest building—and save them valuable energy for breeding—here are some recommendations for providing bird-friendly nesting materials.

Safe Materials

Twigs or small sticks: Natural materials that birds could find on their own are good baselines for nesting components. You can collect twigs or small sticks to pile or loosely bundle together in your yard, allowing birds easy access to materials they would otherwise have to search for.

Leaves and other yard waste: Keep debris and leaf litter around your yard instead of perfectly manicuring your lawn for spring. Although it comes at the price of a less picturesque space, the birds will appreciate it (as will your back).

Small pieces of straw: You can find straw at the nearest Home Depot or any other home improvement store. Pile the straw outside in a spot easy for birds to find.

Grass clippings: If you trim your grass, consider piling clippings in your lawn instead of throwing them in the trash. However, if you're going to go this route, be sure you don't use fertilizers, pesticides, or other chemicals on your grass.

Native plants: An excellent way to make your yard <u>bird-friendly</u> and provide easy access to safe nesting materials is by growing <u>native plants</u>. For example, milkweed produces nectar that monarch butterfly caterpillars favor while providing the fluff that birds use to line their nests.

Materials to Avoid

Human hair: According to Gordon, human hair is a triple threat for birds: It's long, thin, and strong. These characteristics can be a deadly combination, allowing the hair to easily ensnare a bird's leg or wing and sever it. "You can wrap [hair] around your finger and cut your circulation off," she says.

Yarn or string: Long strands of yarn and string can wrap around a bird. Hatchlings are particularly susceptible to such entanglements, Yarn in a nest can get caught around a baby bird and cut off circulation as it grows.

Dryer lint: Although it is popular to put out and seems like the perfect lining for a nest, dryer lint quickly loses its fluffiness and structure when wet. Dryer lint is unsustainable in the rain, crumbling and leaving holes in an otherwise solid nest.

Also NO: no metal, plastic, mylar ribbon, animal fur exposed to flea pesticide treatments, etc.

Stephanie Thornton's Candied Pecans

Ingredients

- 1/2 cup white sugar
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper (option)
- 4 cups pecans halves
- 1 egg white

Instructions

Heat oven to 300 degrees.

Prepare a baking sheet with parchment paper. Set aside.

In a large ziplock bag, add white sugar, brown sugar, cinnamon, salt, and cayenne pepper. Toss to combine. Set aside.

In a medium-size bowl, whisk egg white until frothy. Add in pecans and toss to coat. Pour the pecans into the bag with sugar mixture. Toss until pecans are coated. Place on the prepared baking sheet and bake in oven for 40 minutes. Toss after 20 minutes and continue to cook. Remove from oven and let cool.

Store in an airtight container until ready to serve.

Greek Salad Vínaígrette (Ina Garten -slíghtly modífíed by Carríe Seeman)

Greek Vinaigrette: Makes about ³/₄ cup dressing

- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1/4 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1/2 teaspoon Dijon mustard
- 1/4 cup good red wine vinegar
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 1/2 cup good olive oil

In glass jar, combine all ingredients except olive oil. Cover and shake to combine. Add olive oil, cover, and shake again until well combined and emulsified. Store in the refrigerator. Take out 30 min prior so that the dressing can come to room temp. Shake to emulsify if necessary.

For the garden guild even, I used Costco California olive oil and a decent (but inexpensive) red wine vinegar (Colavita brand) purchased from the grocery store.

Services Agreement

May I thank you for selecting me to provide animal management and training services for your pet. You have asked me to perform training with your pet named above for purposes of reducing the likelihood that your pet will purposely encounter and approach a venomous rattlesnake. This program is called Rattlesnake Aversion Training. I would like to define my scope of work, the costs, and some of the risks and limitations of this work before we proceed.

Scope of Work

It is anticipated that I will provide the services specified in this agreement with the pet(s) named above according to the following scope of work.

1) I will obtain a history of your pets age, health and behavior. Based upon the information provided to me in the Pet Health and History Questionnaire (above), I might ask need to ask you further follow up questions. Prior to commencement of this aversion training it is important that you advise me of any known health problems that might make this training ill advised. It is suggested that you have your pet examined by a licensed veterinarian before we begin this work to make sure that there are no health limitations that would make this training contraindicated.

2) I will provide the necessary training equipment for purposes of implementing the aversion training. This will include electric stimulus collars, leashes and live rattlesnakes.

3) Using this equipment I will train your pet named above in one session by use of behavioral aversive training techniques to have an aversive behavioral response to a rattlesnake. Any additional or reinforcement sessions are certainly recommended, but are beyond the scope of this agreement.

4) During this training I will advise you of and allow you to observe the outcome, and then counsel you regarding recommended follow up reinforcement training that would be advisable in the future.

Costs and Expenses

I will provide the equipment and services defined in the scope of work above for the fixed fee of \$______per animal payable on the date I am to perform these services.

Limitations and Risks

Before you agree to have me perform the scope of work outlined above, it is important that you understand the limitations and risks of this proposal, and that you give an informed consent.

1) All behavioral training techniques including the work defined in the above scope of work have limitations, including but not limited to the following major limitations.

a) There may still be a small risk that your pet will encounter and fail to avoid contact with a venomous reptile.

b) Behavioral training may lose effectiveness over time unless reinforced with further training sessions.2) The specific technique I will use may have the following risks of harm to your pet.

a) The venomous reptiles I will use in this training will be muzzled. All precautions will be taken to ensure the safety of your pet, our trainers and the snakes. Although the risk is **VERY SMALL**, there is still a chance the snake can envenomate and can possibly inflict other injury to your pet.

Conclusion and Agreement to Provide Services

If the above scope of work meets with your approval in light of the limitations and risks involved, I will be very pleased to commence my work. Please then sign this services agreement below, and upon receipt of the fee for the costs and expenses I will commence the training.
